### Abraham Lincoln's 215th birthday is Monday, February 12, 2024.





Lincoln was born on February 12, 1809 in Hodgenville, Kentucky and was murdered on April 14, 1865 in Washington D.C. Lincoln became America's 16th president in 1860, and is widely regarded as America's greatest President for his leadership during the Civil War and the abolition of slavery.

Celebrations of the murdered President's birthday began in 1873 by a Buffalo, New York drug store owner, Julius E. Francis. He was passionate about preserving the legacy of Abraham Lincoln. Francis spent his own money to organize and produce an elaborate annual event commemorating Lincoln's birthday. Additionally, Julius Francis petitioned Congress to institute a national holiday on the date of Lincoln's birthday. Francis died in 1881 without achieving his goal. However, he did establish Buffalo Lincoln's Birthday Association to continue to petition Congress for the holiday. Lincoln's birthday was never approved as a U. S. Federal holiday, but was approved as a legal holiday in many states to commemorate President Abraham Lincoln's birth.

The Wilkinsburg Historical Society annually recognizes Abraham Lincoln's February 12th birthday by placing a wreath at the statue of Lincoln plaza, intersection of the Lincoln Highway and William Penn Highway in Wilkinsburg.

### **February is Black History Month!**



Why was the month of February chosen to be a celebration of Black history in America? In the late 19th century celebrations of Abraham Lincoln's birthday were established by African-American communities in the United States, Many African-Americans revered Abraham Lincoln because of his fierce abolitionist stance. He issued the Emancipation Proclamation on January 1, 1863 to abolish slavery in all of the rebellious states. The Civil War became a war for freedom, and the destruction of slavery had begun. This document became one of the most important ever written. The Union won the Civil War and less than a week later President Lincoln was assassinated. Black communities begin to celebrate Lincoln's birthday (February 12) along with celebrating the birthday of former slave and abolitionist Frederick Douglass. Frederick Douglass's birthday was February 14. 1818.

Carter Godwin Woodson (December 19, 1875- April 3, 1950) was the "Father of Negro History Week", later to become "Black History Month". Carter Woodson was an American historian, author, journalist and the founder of the Association for the Study of African American Life and History (ASALH). Woodson was the founder of The Journal of Negro Story in 1916, and has been called the "father of Black history". In February 1926, he launched the celebration of "Negro History Week" to be the second week of February. He chose that week to coincide with the traditional Black commemorations of both Lincoln's and Douglass' birthdays. The idea of a Negro History Week was a popular one, and to honor Negro History Week parades, breakfasts, speeches, lectures, poetry readings, banquets, and exhibits were commonly held. The Black United Students and Black educators at Kent State University expanded this idea to include an entire month beginning on February 1, 1970. Since 1970, "Negro History Week" had become "Black History Month". Since 1976, every US president has designated February as Black History Month. Black History Month has expanded further to Canada where it is also celebrated in February and to the United Kingdom which celebrates it in October.

Carter Woodson was a brilliant man whose education included degrees from Berea College and the University of Chicago also held a PhD from Harvard University. His resume also includes Dean of Howard University. Woodson devoted the rest of his life to historical research until his death in 1950. He worked to preserve the history of African Americans and accumulated a collection of thousands of artifacts and publications. Woodson noted that African-American contributions "were overlooked, ignored, and even suppressed by the writers of history textbooks and the teachers who use them." The Borough of Wilkinsburg has recently hired its first archivist/historian, **Cassandra McGinnis**. Cassandra has an important job in identifying available historic materials, creating inventory, and preventing the loss of valuable information. Cassandra has been asked to write a piece about herself, her background, education and her ambitions for her new job with the Wilkinsburg Borough. *Archives* readers will now be able to know her better. Following is Cassandra's personal essay:

Hello everyone, it is my privilege to introduce myself, Cassandra McGinnis, as the new archivist for the Borough of Wilkinsburg. I am so looking forward to assisting in the preservation of Wilkinsburg's history and assisting all of you with your research endeavors. A little about myself, I'm originally from the DC area and I graduated from Northern Virginia Community College in the Spring of 2023 with a C.S.C in Public History and Historic Conservation. In that program, I studied archives management under the Archives Manager for the Historic Courthouse Archives in the Fairfax County Courthouse. It was also while in that program that I interned at the Smithsonian's National Museum of Asian Art, within the Department of Visitor Education and Engagement. I spent the entire summer of 2022 assisting the museum's robust docent team research for and craft tours. Since the Fall of 2023, I've been studying at the University of Pittsburgh, working towards a bachelor's in art history, concentrating in ancient to early medieval Celtic Art with a minor in Gaeilge (the Irish language).










Wilkinsburg Public Library contains a busy Children's Department which hosts a variety of activities each month. The Children's Department is under the direction of librarian Charlene Castronovo. Shown above is the schedule for February and it includes activities for Black History Month.

For over a century the Wilkinsburg Library has featured programming for the neighborhood children. In 1921 Children's Hour was inaugurated with schoolchildren coming from the Borough schools to hear stories read by the librarian. The library was given the use of a large lecture room of the Westinghouse Club to accommodate the crowds of children. Nearly 1000 children attended the first week of Children's Hour in 1921.







These are the three books that the **Wilkinsburg Historical Society** wrote and published during the past twelve years. They help to promote and preserve the history of Wilkinsburg and raise funds for the various projects of the Society. All three books are still available to purchase from the Society. Another way to support the activities of the Historical Society.

On the far left is "Images of America - Wilkinsburg", a 128 page soft-bound book printed by the Arcadia Publishing Company. It includes over 220 black and white photos depicting the history of our town from the early land patents in the late 1700s up to the 75th celebration of Wilkinsburg in 1962. The book is available from the Wilkinsburg Historical Society for \$20.00, plus \$3.00 for shipping.

The middle book above is "Wilkinsburg High School - Century of Learning 1911-2011". This book chronicles the history of the local high school from its early start in the late 1880s, the creation of the magnificent structure in 1910, and each decade since with highlights of the events that were important in the lives of the students and the Wilkinsburg community. For over 100 years the Wilkinsburg High School served the Borough of Wilkinsburg students and this book has several hundred photos showing much of this important history. This Century of Learning book is available from the Wilkinsburg Historical Society for \$15.00, plus \$3.00 for shipping.

The book on the far right is "Wilkinsburg - 1887-2012, Celebrating the Past, Present and Future". This book was produced by the Historical Society in 2012 to recognize the 125th anniversary of Wilkinsburg's incorporation as a Borough. This soft-bound book has 196 pages and includes chapters on the history of Wilkinsburg, the celebrations from the past, information about Wilkinsburg's government, and all the events that occurred during the 125th celebration. There are several chapters about the clubs and organizations in Wilkinsburg as well as the churches and worship centers in the Borough. The "future of Wilkinsburg" section recognizes advertisers and sponsors who helped to fund the creation and printing of the book. This book, originally \$15.00, is now available for \$10.00, plus \$3.00 for shipping.
